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February PDM Inventory Control – (Perishable and Obsolescence) Presented by: Dennis Lord, CPIM

OBJECTIVE:

To impart a fundamental knowledge of inventory control providing participants with a greater understanding of their roles and responsibilities in the planning and control of inventory and the impact on customer service, inventory investment and profit margins. Inventory control for perishable products and obsolescence will be covered with appropriate examples.

He began by asking the guestion why have an S&OP? The answer was that to not have an S&OP was to not have any plan at all. And having no plan at all is not a sure way of meeting customer expectations. Having demonstrated that we need a plan, Rob reduced S&OP to its fundamental elements. Those being what are we going to sell and what are we able to make. The sales forecast is not to be for individual SKU's but for logical groups of parts. With the sales forecast in hand it is time to find the true productive capacity for each of the different groups. This is what we are able to make. Now its is time to decide on the time frame within which we will plan. The company that Rob works for does monthly S&OP. In comparing the forecast against available capacity the organization can find where they will face difficulties serving customer demand. After a hearty round of applause, our President Don Baich thanked Rob and presented him with a decorative pewter plate as a gift (below).

INVENTORY CONTROL – PERISHABLE AND OBSOLESCENCE

A one-day workshop presented by Dennis Lord, CPIM on Friday February 20 2004

You have too much inventory! The inventory you have is the wrong inventory and it's not turning. Obsolescence is at an all time high. What do you do about it?

You may be in food processing, pharmaceuticals, or high tech industry and have to deal with replenishing perishable products.

Perishable and Obsolescence – What do they mean? What are the underlying problems, which generate excess and obsolete inventory? What is their impact on customer service, inventory investment, and profitability?

Beginning with a review of the "**basics**" of inventory control we will then focus on the financial impact of inventory, segmentation using ABC, forecasting, replenishment techniques and safety stocks. You will examine how these tried and proven techniques work, with lots of paper and pencil exercises. We will discuss how to reduce the formation of slow moving, excess, and ultimately obsolete inventory that distorts inventory turns, require stock write down, and a major cause of loss of profitability.

You are encouraged to bring examples of your workplace issues to this workshop for discussion.

Who should attend this workshop?

This workshop is appropriate for managers, supervisors, and analysts concerned with the planning, management, and control of inventory. It is especially valuable for materials and purchasing managers and planners, buyers, controllers, and anyone overseeing the inventory decision-making function. It will also benefit those looking for a refresher in inventory control or APICS certification maintenance points.
