What are we up to?

A report on what the new APICS board portfolio champions are doing to get ready for a new semester.

Education – Jason Young

This month I thought I would discuss how APICS Fraser Valley trains the top quality instructors who teach our courses.

The first requirement is that an instructor must have CPIM certification. Next, they must successfully complete the APICS *Train the Trainer* course that teaches them the basics of instruction. The third requirement is that they must put those skills to use *co-instructing* with an APICS qualified instructor for at least one round of classes. Finally we encourage our instructors to take the *Learning Dynamics* course made available through BCIT.

After all of these steps, we can be sure that we have given the instructor the tools they need to convey the body of knowledge to their students. If you are potentially interesting in being an APICS instructor please contact me anytime.

Programs - Warren Hurlen

As a Director of Programs, I must ensure that we have relevant events throughout the year for our members. The results of the surveys at each PDM are tallied and we try our best to satisfy our member's requests.

In early April of every year, there is a planning session, where all members are invited to offer additional input as to what type of events they would like to have done. Well it has been one year since taking on the roll of Treasurer for the APICS Fraser Valley Chapter. As a person with virtually no experience in Bookkeeping or Accounting I knew that some challenges were lying ahead.

Starting from scratch, we as the board of the APICS Fraser Valley Chapter, had to develop a strategic plan for the chapter. My part in this plan was to create a realistic budget that could be used to judge our progress against the forecasted budget. As a new person to APICS with minimal experience I was at a loss as to where to start on developing a budget. With some help from the Vancouver Chapter Treasurer, I was provided with a template for a proposed budget for an APICS Chapter.



With rough outlines as to our expenses and revenue from each portfolio on the board I was able to put together a proposed budget for the upcoming year. **To my surprise something that I honestly feared was nothing to fear at all.**

So this led me to my next step in my journey which was to purchase Quick Books® accounting software and set up a non-profit organization to keep track of the books for the chapter. Again with help from the Vancouver Chapter I was able to open a new company and develop a chart of accounts. This was one of my most satisfying moments of the year. From this point forward there were countless new experiences that have helped me in learning accounting/bookkeeping processes from balancing the registration at a PDM to providing monthly financial statements to the board of directors. All of these experiences have helped me grow and develop my own personal skills as well as watching a new organization develop from an idea into one that is financially stable and starting to grow with new memberships.

I look forward to the next year to further develop the skills I have learned while continuing to help build a strong APICS Chapter in the Fraser Valley.

I would also like to take this time to extend the invitation to anyone who would like to develop there own skills while being a part of an exciting new and growing organization.

Fundamentals of Inventory Control

Participants are introduced to essential vocabulary and skills in identifying and applying the basic principles of inventory management. Basic methods of planning and controlling inventory in manufacturing, institutional, distribution, and retail environments are covered. The questions of what to stock are addressed through an examination of current and evolving technologies of inventory management.

Objective

This course will impart a fundamental knowledge and understanding of inventory management principles and techniques, providing participants with a greater understanding of their roles and responsibilities in the control of inventory and the impact that inventory can have on a business
