The April PDM was not only an informative dinner meeting but our Annual General Meeting as well, so we had somewhat of an extended agenda. Please read the first page for details of our elections and elsewhere for additional information from the evening.

Our Guest Speaker for the evening was Neil Godin, one of the nations leading experts on managing change and leadership (very appropriate topic given the election of a new board). Here is a quick summary of Neil's very impassioned presentation.

Imagine if one day you woke up and no longer had the use of your writing hand, what would you do? Would you give up hope or proceed to teach yourself how to function with the other hand?

In this day and age, this is the uncomfortable position more and more people are finding themselves in. Our lives and traditional views of the workplace are being rocked like never before. As Neil put it, we are "witnesses to the end of the industrial age", at least in the first world countries. Even locally, statistics are showing that more and more people are finding their own work through setting up small businesses, contracting, etc. Even if we are somewhat secure in our "cocoon", we must start to think like entrepreneurs and take control of our own futures.

How do we do this? Start by being **extremely passionate** about whatever it is you do. Being passionate is contagious and demonstrates leadership. Speaking of leadership, those who thrive these turbulent times will be the ones who take the position of **leading change** rather than resisting it and those who help others to deal with the change by finding ways to motivate them to embrace it. It is also important to have a clear and **well thought out sense of purpose** to act as a roadmap in achieving your goals and influencing those around you in a positive fashion, whether they be your co-workers, friends or family.

Neil feels that this is one area in which our educational systems are sorely outdated. Although things are improving slowly, generally speaking we don't equip people for the new realities of today. Greater focus needs to be placed on developing **change leaders** with exceptional **interpersonal skills** and well developed **creative thinking** processes.

Those that can manage conflict and turmoil and demonstrate "personal leadership" will be the successes of tomorrow. We need to look at the changes that are affecting us now as opportunities as well as challenges and keep in mind there is a silver lining to all this turmoil.

Neil most definitely had an impact on those of us who had the good fortune to witness his presentation. While not being specifically about SCM, it is a theme which is very pertinent to us all.
